8 Information Commissions Function At Reduced Capacity, says Study

Delhi: Eight information commissions, including Central Information Commission (CIC), are functioning at reduced capacity and the waiting time for applicants' Right to Information (RTI) cases could extend to up to 18 years before they are heard, an independent annual study has revealed.

An annual study conducted by Sartak Nagrik Sangathan and Centre for Equity Studies has revealed a grim picture of RTI Act implementation with cases piling up before information commissions, which are functioning at depleted capacity as state governments and the Centre have not filled the vacancies. CIC and information commissions in Maharashtra, Uttar Pradesh, Kerala, Karnataka, West Bengal, Telangana and Odisha are functioning at less than the sanctioned strength of information commissioners, while commissions in Rajasthan and Tamil Nadu are without a chief.

This has led to a huge backlog of cases at the information commissions. Using data on the backlog of cases in commissions and their monthly rate of disposal, the study has estimated the time the applicant would have to wait to be heard. Andhra Pradesh commission, which was non-functional for 17 months between May 2017 and October 2018, has the highest all-India waiting time.

An applicant would have to wait for 18 years before he is heard in the state. West Bengal, which finishes second on the list, has improved its record considerably. In March 2018, the waiting time was estimated at 43 years in West Bengal, which has now reduced to seven years and five months. While the worst performing states on this parameter remain the same, the commissions have reduced the waiting time. Others on the list include Odisha (4 years 3 months), Kerala (2 years 3 months) and Uttar Pradesh (1 year 11 months).

While almost all states have improved their pendency and waiting time, CIC has gone down on this parameter. The waiting time in CIC was 10 months last year but has increased to 1 year 7 months this year, according to the study.

An analysis of background of information commissioners and chief information commissioners reveals that a majority of them are former government servants. About 83% of chiefs and 58% of information commissioners are former government servants. The assessment found the gender composition of commissions to be extremely skewed. Since the passage of the RTI Act in 2005, merely 10% of all information commissioners across the country have been women. In terms of Chief Information Commissioners, the gender parity is even worse, with less than 7% chiefs being women. A new trend flagged in the assessment is the large number of appeals and complaints being returned for not following a format of application.
